Speaker's Statement

Speaker (Mr. Akoak): As the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, I am honoured to welcome our guests to the House for the first sitting of the Sixth Legislative Assembly.

We all look forward to the day when our Visitors' Gallery can be fully reopened to Nunavummiut.

I would like to thank all members for the trust and confidence that you have placed in me by selecting me to serve as your Speaker.

As your Speaker, I am committed to upholding the rights and privileges of this institution and its members.

All members can be confident that I will fulfill the responsibilities of the Speakership in a manner that is consistent with the office's obligation to demonstrate fairness and impartiality.

Earlier today all Members of this House took their oaths of allegiance and office.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my constituents in Gjoa Haven for their support during the recent election.

I can assure all residents of Gjoa Haven that I will be advocating for the constituency through the appropriate channels and in an appropriate manner.

We will now proceed with the orders of the day.

At this time I will ask the Clerk to determine if Her Honour, the Commissioner of Nunavut, is prepared to enter the Chamber to deliver the Opening Address.

Opening Address of the Commissioner of Nunavut

Commissioner Eva Qamaniq Aariak (interpretation): Good afternoon. I extend a very warm welcome to you.

Mr. Speaker, Premier, Members of the Legislative Assembly, honoured guests, and Nunavummiut who are watching the televised proceedings, good afternoon to you all.

I look forward to the day when circumstances allow us to fully reopen to the public, and I pay tribute to all those who have been working so hard to protect our territory and people during this unprecedented and challenging time of pandemic.

Earlier today I had the distinct honour of presiding over the swearing-in ceremony for the Members of the Sixth Legislative Assembly of Nunavut.

I know from personal experience the feelings that many of you are experiencing today.

A number of you are serving in your second or third terms of office, and I thank you for your continued commitment to Nunavut and Nunavummiut.

A number of you are newly elected members, and I thank you for assuming the challenges and responsibilities that accompany public office.

Earlier this week you selected the Premier and members of the Executive Council.

I will speak English after I say this.

Formal motions to confirm these selections will be made during today's sitting, and I look forward to signing the official instruments of appointment.

(interpretation ends) In our territory's non-partisan, consensus style of government, all Members of the Legislative Assembly play an important role, and I am confident that you will all make valuable contributions to the deliberations of this House during your terms of office.

I'm just realizing that I have been covering my mouth the whole time.

In the coming weeks and months, you will focus your collective energies towards defining a mandate for your term.

As I noted this morning, I look forward to joining you from time to time in this Chamber when I am called upon to give assent to the bills which you as an Assembly deem fit to pass.

As Inuit and Nunavummiut, I wish to conclude by reflecting on the pride that we take in the recent appointment of Her Excellency Mary Simon as our country's Governor General, and we extend our warmest wishes to Her Majesty.

Member's Statement 001 – 6(1): Reflections on Being Elected to Represent Iqaluit-Tasiluk

Mr. Hickes: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to publicly take this opportunity to congratulate you on your appointment. I know most members, if not all members, know I have a deep appreciation for the role of the Speaker of an Assembly, and I trust you will serve honourably. Thank you.

Mr. Main (interpretation): Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I hadn't raised my hand, but I appreciate that you acknowledged me anyway.

Firstly, I want to publicly acknowledge my constituents in Arviat and Whale Cove; much appreciated. We didn't have a vote in my constituency of Arviat and Whale Cove, but being acclaimed is something I feel much encumbered by.

And further, I constantly receive feedback from my constituents about my performance, especially when I am faithfully conducting my work in Inuktitut, that I am aware my constituents notice when I use their language and I want to state now in Inuktitut that I promise to be even more diligent in my work, in speaking, and I promise to work hard to convey that in the future years.

On occasion when my Inuktitut vocabulary is lacking, then I usually switch to English. Nonetheless, I am being taught here and there by either the interpreters here or translators elsewhere, and by my colleagues and I commit to continuing that in all spheres.

Mr. Speaker, we all know that Nunavummiut are experiencing difficult times; the housing shortage, for example, health and mental health, elder care, and the need to look for employment solutions. Looking at these issues singularly is very overwhelming and in conjunction with facing them all, we all know that feels hopeless.

And, Mr. Speaker, much rhetoric is spouted in this House about the need to work together, so I say let us indeed work together in this House to collaboratively cooperate on issues so that our constituents can realize actual benefits, as they have heard all the political rhetoric in years past.

Nevertheless, in the Sixth Assembly, how can we make the need to work together more concrete using Inuit culture and perspectives so that our government works amid operational changes to allow us to work together? Let us realize something that will allow us to work together in the coming years. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

She is a recent college graduate and I am very proud of her.

Mr. Speaker, I don't want to forget to mention someone who has been given to us. Because we adopt children, we adopted a son, my son, David, who is a real hunter. What I really liked during lunchtime was... .

To conclude, I have been a leader previously as a mayor in Qikiqtarjuaq. I have come to the understanding that when you work hard at hard, challenging things, I know that and I will be doing that here, representing the two communities here. I'm very happy about that.

I would like to express my pride in the person who ran against me in Clyde River, Sheila Enook. We always have opportunities. Our time eventually comes, so please, we have to keep on trying and, if we keep on trying, we get to where we want to go. I am very proud of my competition in the last election.

My assistant, my daughter-in-law, Daisy Arnaquq, and others... . Airline tickets are very expensive. I received some great help through fundraising. Taina Kooneeliusee and others did some fundraising for me and I was able to go to Clyde River.

I was up in the Uqqummiut community of Clyde River and I would like to thank Lysia Panipak and her daughter, Marissa. I don't know them very well, but they warmly welcomed me. I have hardly ever been to Clyde River and they gave me the perfect space to stay at, so I thank them for that.

Mr. Speaker, I understand and recognize that this is a complex and challenge issue. Our government is spending millions of dollars to pay for specialize care in the southern facilities. We lack resources.

Later today I will be speaking at the appropriate time to join my colleagues to present a petition on this important issue.

Mr. Speaker, I want to finish my statement by again congratulating you and all the members and also to the returning members and as well to the new members. Let's all work together to represent Nunavummiut and let's work hard together for all of Nunavummiut. Thank you.
